BLM's National Landscape Conservation System: Minimal Funding, Maximum Needs

The National Landscape Conservation System (NLCS) was established in June of 2000 to encompass the best of the lands and waters under the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM's) stewardship. The System consists of 26 million acres of spectacular National Monuments, National Conservation Areas, Wilderness Areas, Wilderness Study Areas, Wild and Scenic Rivers, and National Historic and Scenic Trails.

Since its creation, the NLCS has been chronically under-funded at about \$41 million a year.

Funding has **not** kept pace with:

Annual NLCS Funding:

- The System's expansion by about a million acres since 2001;
- Increasing visitor numbers, off-road vehicle use, and vandalism;
- Inflation:
- The completion of land use plans for the newest NLCS National Monuments and Conservation Areas. These plans provide the BLM with detailed guidance for managing these special places for the next decade. However, without additional funding, the BLM cannot *implement* the plans. More specifically, BLM cannot educate visitors, restore habitat, monitor cultural sites and wildlife, close roads, or take other essential actions specified in the plans which are necessary to protect resources.

Under-funding leaves BLM unable to adequately complete its conservation mandates!
